snap. He eagerly watches audiences, during his personal appearances, to gauge reactions to his selections. Moreover, he, unlike some maestros, honors requests for special or favorite numbers. And all fan mail receives the most careful attention from him.

Southern couples have danced to Jan Garber's music; and so have terpsichorean devotees in other parts of the United States. He and his boys are greeted with outflung arms of welcome and pleasure here in Los Angeles and Hollywood.

Garber himself has an agreeable manner. He laughs and spins jokes during his performances. It affords him gladness to sign autograph books. He considers his job fun. And he fulfills his task in the hope that others will derive satisfaction from his music.

Betting on horse races was his favorite pastime until losses greatly outweighed the returns. Now he finds his most enjoyable recreation in a few rounds of golf.

Yearly, nation-wide surveys plummet the likes of music-lovers; and these tests show that Jan Garber's orchestra enjoys a high popularity rating. His have been giant forward strides since he conceived the idea of his band during student days at the University of North Carolina. If Guy Lombardo plays "the sweetest music this side of Heaven," Jan Garber is, experts agree, a close runner-up for that honor.
